NEW RESTAURANT COMING TO MARIEMONT

Scott Schmidt, founder and owner of Looking Glass Hospitality Group (LGHG) has announced that a new restaurant will be opening in the space next to the Mariemont Theater. Mr. Schmidt's organization works with independent restaurateurs and entrepreneurs to assist in restaurant concept and design. Two successful Cincinnati area restaurants Mr. Schmidt and LGHG have opened are Tohana Kitchen and Bar in Blue Ash and S.W. Clyborne in Mason. Mr. Schmidt has said that the new restaurant in the Village will be a seafood restaurant called "The Emery". Mr. Schmidt has a proven record of providing great food and a wonderful dining experience. We will keep you updated when the opening is scheduled, which should be sometime around the end of the year. It has been my pleasure working with Bill Spinnenweber to make this happen.

RIBBON CUTTING FOR NATIVE AMERICAN CULTURAL & EDUCATION CENTER – SEPT 4TH AT 6PM

In 1871, Dr. Charles Metz began an investigation of the area at the top of Miami Bluff, now known as the Madisonville Site, where he discovered a cache of Native American artifacts. The Metz family offered to share some of those artifacts with the Village to display in our Native American Cultural and Education Center. With the artifacts now in place, we have scheduled the ribbon-cutting for *Wednesday*, *September 4th at 6PM*. The Cultural Center fulfills Mary Emery's dream of having a museum in the Village. The map of the original layout of the Village, as designed by John Nolen, shows



a museum located at the end of Mariemont Avenue, near the pool. The event also gives us an opportunity to thank two people who were very instrumental in making the Cultural Center a reality and those two people will be the ones cutting the ribbon. We must first thank State Representative Tom Brinkman who was the driving force in securing the \$400,000 grant that made construction of the center possible. His commitment to the Village has also included getting a grant for the renovation of Resthaven Barn a few years ago. Representative Brinkman also offered the Village a lot of support to keep the Eastern Corridor from cutting through our South 80, as did Dr. Ken Tankersley. Dr. Tankersley, a University of Cincinnati professor, has

conducted several archeological digs in the South 80 and was able to show proof that the South 80 was once home to a Native American village. This discovery helped to establish the historic significance of the South 80 and that played a big part in keeping the Eastern Corridor out of Mariemont. With the help of some of his University of Cincinnati students, Dr. Tankersley has done a fantastic job of setting up and labeling the artifacts for display. All of this work has been done at no cost to the Village. We are fortunate to have Dr. Tankersley's expertise. We look forward to recognizing the contribution of both Representative Brinkman and Dr. Tankersley at the ribbon cutting. Additionally, we want to thank Council members Bill Brown and Mary Anne Schwartz for all of their work during the design, construction, and furnishing of the Municipal Building addition and the Cultural Center.






NEW SCHOOL YEAR TO BEGIN

Asian Longhorned Beetle



With our community having so many trees, it is important that each of us looks for the beetle in our own yards and in our parks. Trees that have been infested will have holes about as big around as a pencil, like those shown in the photo at right. This year's Warrior Run will be held on October 5th and registration is now open. The Warrior Run honors those lost to suicide or mental illness, and raises money for mental health and suicide prevention programs for local schools. The Warrior Run offers a one-mile walk and a 5K run/walk through scenic Mariemont. There is also a Kids Fun Run. This family-

friendly event includes free food, music, carnival-style kids games, and an outdoor movie after the race! There is even a VIRTUAL RACE. If you are unable to attend the race on 10/5/2019 but still want to participate, you can register for the Warrior Run Virtual Race. For \$5 you can be a virtual runner individually or on a team. You run or walk 5K or 1 Mile at your location and post a picture on social media. You will also have the option to purchase a special "Warrior Run Virtual Race" t-shirt. Proceeds from Warrior Run benefit the newly revamped Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center's (CCHMC) Surviving the Teens--Adapt for Life® program plus local in-school mental health programs.
